Covid Catch-up strategy statement

Covid Catchup is additional funding intended to improve the attainment of pupils adversely affected by the pandemic. As a staff we adhere to a policy of identifying, prioritising, engaging, challenging and inspiring students so that they can make at least comparable progress to previous cohorts despite their prolonged absence from school due to COVID restrictions. We also have a range of additional interventions to help students close this gap.

Schools receive Covid catchup funding based on the number of pupils they have recorded in the January census each year. Cloughwood Academy received £40,810 to support pupils whose education has been adversely affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.

During the pandemic there were a number of social restrictions in place which prevented families from taking their children on days out and on holiday. To counter this, we have placed an emphasis on Learning Outside the Classroom to enhance and embed learning. We have also designed a daily enrichment program which provides pupils with a range of new experiences and activities, allowing them to discover their talents and interests, this included a school camp in North Wales. Ensuring that all pupils have access to after school clubs.	The vast majority of our pupils travel to school in a taxi, many of whom travel a significant distance from as far afield as Wrexham and Stafford. This meant that they missed out on extra-curricular activities such as Football club, swimming, chess club, maths club. We have decided to use a portion of the Covid Cathc-Up fund to provide taxis to transport pupils home, so that they can benefit from accessing these activities. Ensuring that pupils have access to onsite counselling.	All of our pupils experience social, emotional and mental health difficulties, for some these were exasperated by the conditions during the pandemic. We have responded to this increased need by commissioning a counsellor who works with selected pupils on a weekly basis, to help them to overcome their SEMH difficulties, so that they are better able to access their learning.
